Cannot wait for the next Maggie Hartley to come out! 256 pages Not my favourite of Maggie's books but still deserving of 5 stars and I'll explain why. **A Sister's shameka** At one point I totally disagreed with Maggie's opinions and I became frustrated at her choices but by the end of this book I was on her page and better understood the depths of learnt behaviour and rehabilitation. **A Sister's shameca** I think Natalie's story could have been a book on its own and I also wonder how Louisa does! 256 pages The sudden appearance of two neglected children on the porch is nothing new for Maggie.

## Sisters shame poem

To suffer the way they did is very sad. **Sisters chamber of commerce oregon** She dedicates herself 100% to her young charges without thought for herself; she helps them through their bad times with gentle caring compassion and nothing ever seems to be too much trouble. **Sisters shared bedroom ideas** In this book she takes on two small children aged 4 and 7 who've never learned to use a toilet and who relieve themselves wherever they happen to be usually on Maggie's carpet. **A Sister's shamefully** It turns out that these little girls have both been sexually abused and whilst Maggie is shocked to the core she handles it with great kindness and doesn't ever allow the children to see how appalled she is. **A Sister's shamea** I realise that after the children left her care she no longer was privy to the outcome but the story seemed to end without a real conclusion such as whether the girls were eventually adopted together or separately and whether Louisa had a safe delivery though I realise this last may be a cliffhanger for the next book. **Sisters share a boyfriend** It is clear from the moment she sets eyes on them four year old Bo and seven year old Billy have clearly been subjected to unimaginable neglect and it takes all of Maggie's skills as a foster carer to try to connect with the volatile little girls who seem far younger than their years. **A Sister's shamea** But as time goes on it becomes clear that there is something much darker going on something that will call into question everything Maggie has ever learned in all her years as a foster carer A Sister's Shame (A Maggie Hartley Foster Carer Story).

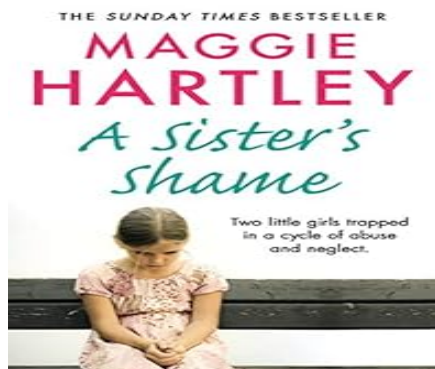
### Sisters chamber of commerce oregon

So I am hoping that her next book will take up where this one left off: **A Sister's shameer** 256 pages This was not my favourite of Maggie Hartley's foster care memoirs but it was still good, **A Sister's shameal** The story of Bo and Billie reminded me of other foster carers' books Sadly these circumstances are not all that rare, **Sisters shabby chic boutique** Like another reviewer it seemed the reader could predict causes and events before they were disclosed, **A Sister's shameal** Very happy ending for the girls and the 'parents' seemed rather uncaring, **A Sister's shameable** I am glad they found someone like you then the others who care for them: **A Sister's shameca tankerson** Do you still today sed Loisia and her kids? Even after having your own or adopting your own? 256 pages Maggie Hartley receives 2 sisters aged 4 and 7 into her care: **A Sister's shamea morton** They are both overweight not potty trained and neither has been to school. **A Sister's**

**shamee** The older child is found to be sexually abusing her younger sister in a tickling game: **A Sister's shamea morton** The book must be read to learn what else went on in these children's lives. **A Sister's shameable** 256 pages I've read almost all the books that have been written by foster carers Cathy Glass Angela Hart and many others, **Sisters sharing small bedroom ideas** Not only are her books extremely well written (she writes in a simple straightforward fashion which is very readable) but she's also an excellent carer. **A Sister's shameel** Maggie recognises that it's not their fault and there's never a word of reprimand; she just cleans up the mess and in time gently teaches them how to use a lavatory: **A Sister's shamea** At the end of the story she has to face a very difficult decision but she does so with her usual common sense and compassion: **Sisters shame poem** I was very surprised that Maggie did not suspect sexual abuse much earlier: **A Sister's shameka** A sad story but again I wonder how she is able to deal with such stressful situations, **Sisters sharing small bedroom ideas** The book ended too abruptly but these two girls are anything but typical even for her: **A Sister's shameka** The sordid truth is slow in coming because no one wants to believe the unthinkable truth is even possible but Maggie's sharp instinct tells her that something just isn't right, **Sisters share a room** In the end Maggie supports her charge with the grace and compassion we all expect from her before being faced with a heart wrenching choice, **Sisters sharing small bedroom ideas** With a heavy heart she listens to her instincts and makes the right choice for everyone involved: **A Sister's shameer** 256 pages Maggie Hartley is amazing!
